- · CPS-ECP / Transport Canada New Distress Signaling DVD is complete, in stock and ready to be ordered. Distress signaling DVD is generating a lot of interest from outside organizations.
- Total membership as at February 1, 2006 stands at 32,062. HQ is continually looking into various membership benefits that would benefit existing members but also attract new members. Please feel free to submit ideas.
- · Vessel Licensing will no longer be available through Customs Canada the changeover from Transport Canada to Services Canada is presenting some problems. It is to go into affect on April 1st, 2006, but with no provision initially for doing so electronically or by fax. It appears that vessel licenses will only be available at the Services Canada offices or by mail. Renewal period of 5 years is suggested. Date of Birth of licensee will be required. - · Transport Canada / Canadian Coast Guard has issued a new edition of the 'Safe Boating Guide'.

Training Officer's Report.....




With our spring training program nearing completion, we can look back on another successful year teaching and promoting safer boating. For the fall and spring sessions we had a total of 225 students enrolled in 13 classes. We would like to express our thanks to the instructors, proctors, and other volunteers, without whose help our training program would have been impossible. We estimate that 30 White Rock Squadron members contributed a total of more than 800 hours of their time to this year's training program. If you would like to help next year, please contact us. Your reward will be knowing you contributed to improving boating safety, and you will find by sharing your knowledge, you will gain almost as much in return through interaction with our students and teachers.

This year saw the introduction of a new "Navigating with GPS" course, and the addition of student CD's for both the GPS and Marine Radio courses. These CD's contain information useful to the student learning the subject, and also allow the student to interact with a VHF radio or GPS unit simulator running on their own computers.

Next year we will begin teaching the new "Boating" course. With many volunteers from across Canada working on new courses and improvements to existing courses, CPS courses will continuously improve and add to the learning experience. White Rock Squadron continued to demonstrate commitment to training by purchasing a third video projector this year, acquiring the new Bateman trophy to be presented to the Piloting student with highest marks, and ordering a flare demonstration kit to be delivered before the fall classes commence.

ATTENTION BOAT OWNERS

Transport Canada would like to inform pleasure craft owners that starting on April 1, 2006, * you can apply for a Pleasure Craft Licence at all 320 Service Canada Centres across the country. For the location nearest you, visit www.servicecanada.gc.ca or call 1 800 O-Canada (1-800-622-6232) TTY 1-800-926-9105.

Pleasure craft of 12m or less and powered by an engine of 10 hp (7.5 kW) or more must display a licence number. This number allows search and rescue personnel and other agencies to identify boats quickly in emergencies.

Transport Canada is the federal government department responsible for overseeing boating safety. For more information about boating safety visit www.boatingsafety.gc.ca.

As of April 1, 2006, Canada Border Services Agency will no longer be issuing licences.

Water Safety Tips...

- ? Learn to swim. The best thing anyone can do to stay safe in and around water is to learn to swim. This includes anyone participating in any boating activity. And... never swim alone.
- ? Read and obey all rules and posted signs.
- ? Don't try to swim against a current if caught in one. Swim gradually out of the current, by swimming across it.
- ? Stay away from pilings, piers and diving platforms when in the water.
- ? Don't rely on flotation devices, such as rafts, you may lose them in the water.
- ? Supervise children closely, even when lifeguards are present.
- ? Swim parallel to shore if you wish to swim long distances.
- ? Alcohol and boating do not mix. Alcohol impairs your judgment, balance and coordination... over 50 percent of drownings result from boating incidents involving alcohol.
- ? For the same reasons it is dangerous to operate an automobile while under the influence of alcohol, people should not operate a boat while drinking alcohol.
- ? Look for the label: Use Coast Guard-approved life jackets for yourself and your passengers when boating and fishing.
- ? Develop a float plan. Anytime you go out in a boat, give a responsible person details about where you will be and how long you will be gone. This is important because if the boat is delayed because of an emergency, becomes lost, or encounters other problems, you want help to be able to reach you.
- ? Watch the weather: Know local weather conditions and prepare for electrical storms. Watch local news programs. Stop boating as soon as you see or hear a storm

SAFE BOATING AWARENESS WEEK, MAY 20 - MAY 26, 2006



Safe Boating Awareness Week will take place across Canada from **May 20 to May 26, 2006**. The purpose of this initiative is to promote a wide range of safe boating practices to the estimated 7 million recreational boaters in Canada.

This initiative is promoted by the Canadian Safe Boating Council, a non-profit organization and its members and partners from all areas of the marine community including manufacturers, boating education organizations, water safety and marine law enforcement sectors. The goal is to ensure that the millions of Canadians who head out on the waters in canoes and kayaks, sailboards and sailboats, fishing boats, personal watercraft, power boats and cruisers are equipped with the knowledge for a safe day on the water.

Catch the spirit!

Canadian Power & Sail Squadrons and Spirit of Canada Ocean Challenges have joined forces to increase public awareness for safe boating.

Canadian Sailing sensation, Derek Hatfield placed third in the 2002 Around Alone single-handed race. He is now preparing to take Canada's name to the world's oceans again. In 2006, aboard the new Open 60, Spirit of Canada, Derek will compete in the 5-Oceans Challenge, the single-handed, around the world race.

As the excitement builds to 2006, CPS-ECP and Spirit of Canada will embark on a series of initiatives, focusing on boating safety, environmental responsibility and youth education.
