Is your CPS Profile Correct? Make sure it is to keep receiving Pacific Yachting!

Starting with the next issue of the Pacific Yachting Magazine we will be using the address in your profile stored on the Canadian Power and Sail Squadron Web-based information system.

You can check your profile by logging onto the system at www.cps-ecp.ca. If this information is outdated or incorrect it is possible that future CPS mailings including Pacific Yachting and Canadian Yachting may be misdirected.

There is provision in your profile to list your boat name and MMSI number, so if you wish these to be listed in the Roster please ensure they are included in your profile. By using the information in your profile, rather than lists maintained manually by each Squadron's Membership Officer, we can eliminate a great deal of work that had to be done by our volunteers. From our members...

An e-mailed travel log sent from one of our squadron member's son on December 11th this week:

"We cruised the Panama Canal yesterday. We approached from the North side, and around 6:00am we could start seeing the cargo ships that were anchored. Ships will have appointments to go through, but sometimes they miss them, or arrive early, and wait in line for an open spot. Yesterday when we went through, there were 42 ships total that were scheduled to traverse the canal that day. Our ship cost about \$170K in fees to traverse. The NCL Pearl that we were on for our Alaska cruise costs over \$300K. About 9:30am we reached the 1st set of locks of a three stage climb up to Gatau Lake. We took on a pilot early on, and a narrator that described the process the whole way. There was quite a bit of activity in the canal as they are busy widening it to allow for 2 large ships to pass through some areas at the same time. We reached the middle set of locks in the afternoon, and then the final set at about 5pm. In the distance we could make out Panama City."

"In the picture, I believe the ship in front of us is the Serenity. This picture was taken from the 1st locks around 0930 EST, I think."

"There are cameras at different points through the 8 hour trip. Go to www.pancanal.com and click on webcam."

Government Liaison Report

Matters of interest to recreational boaters are as follows:

1. Golden Ears Bridge Project

Boaters are advised that barges will stationed at various positions in the Fraser River below the bridge during the raising of bridge deck sections.

Parsons Channel will be closed for a 6 hour period on November 4th while vibration tests are conducted on part of the bridge structure.

2. Second Narrows (Vancouver Harbour)

Navigation aids at Second Narrows, particularly on the east side of the bridges, are to be reviewed shortly. Some updating of the system will be required as deeper draft tankers will be using this channel in the near future.

3. Canadian Hydrographics Service Update

An updated version of Chart No. 1 will be available early in 2009.

A new Pacific Coast Chart Catalogue will also be available early in 2009.

A means of determining levels or "zones of confidence" (ie. reliability) on electronic charts is being explored. A pilot project is underway in the St. Lawrence River to build ENC's that will work in real time and adjust all depths to the current state of the tide.

CHS website will be redesigned early in 2009.

4. Canadian Coast Guard Update

CCG has advised that the logging barge that sank in the vicinity of Robson Bight in August '07 will be raised next year (likely in May '09). Some oil leakage has occurred and it is surmised that some of the equipment on board may still contain thousands of litres of oil.

CCG also plans to remove oil from the USS Zielinski which sank in 1946 approximately 18 miles north of the current resting place of the ferry Queen of the North. The Zielinski contained considerable quantities of bunker fuel, bombs and ammunition. The vessel sits upside down in 100 feet of water on the edge of a 300ft. drop -off. Oil started leaking in 2003; oil removal will likely take place in 2010.

The recent CCG Level of Service Review will be amended to record the fact that no buoy tending vessel is available on West Coast during the months of June to November. Only one ship is available on the west coast of Canada and it spends the summer months in the Arctic.

In 2005, a law was passed requiring boat operators to take a boater safety education course in order to operate a boat in Washington state. The law applies to operators of motorboats with 15 horsepower or greater.

Boaters can take an education course in a classroom, online or at home. Once the course is completed and test passed, boaters need to send a completed application for their card.

If boaters already have taken an approved boating class, they only need to send in their application with supporting documents to get a Boater Education Card.

- . Complete and submit the application for a Boater Education Card along with fee and supporting documents.


Neptune Canada Junction Box Deployed on VENUS Saanich Array

Ocean Works International and the University of Victoria announced the successful deployment of a NEP-TUNE Canada Junction Box on the VENUS Saanich Array. It was one of two units delivered in August and will serve to provide valuable operational data prior to its redeployment, along with 13 other units, on the NEPTUNE Canada Array in the summer of 2009.

This deployment forms part of an extensive series of tests that will ensure a smooth launch of the NEP-

TUNE Canada Array. This July, the Prototype Junction Box unit underwent a rigorous qualification campaign at the Ocean Works facility. Later that month, it was shipped to the Alcatel-Lucent facility in Greenwich, UK for integration testing with a Neptune Node. The Node will provide Junction Boxes power and communications from the 800 km long underwater cable ring.

The NEPTUNE Canada Junction Box, designed and manufactured by Ocean Works, is a uniquely customizable

and highly reliable interface providing up to ten instruments with power and communications from a cabled observatory Node port.
