

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Personal watercraft operation: do's and don'ts

- Do know how to swim and wear a PDF
- Go slowly until you are in a clear area
- Make sure you can be seen at all times
- Check for, and obey, "no wake" signs (read "no wash")
- Look behind you for traffic as you prepare to turn
- Keep a safe distance between you and any other crafts
- Avoid ship channels whenever possible
- Do not speed in congested areas
- Do not come too close to another vessel
- Do not engage in wake jumping.

Did you know what the ancient Viking boat sails were made of?

You may have seen pictures of the distinctive square-sailed vessels the ancient Vikings sailed across the North Sea and out into the Atlantic Ocean. It was with those sails that Vikings made long journeys as far as North America and the eastern Mediterranean Sea.

The Vikings' homeland was not well supplied with plant crops that could supply fibers to weave into sails, but there were plenty of furry animals in that northern climate. Instead of plant fibers, they used wool. The long, strong outer hairs of the sheep were twisted into thin strands for the warp of the wool twill sailcloth, while the perpendicular weft was made of the soft inner hairs. To make the sails water-resistant, the Vikings added tar and fat to the cloth. Their simple square-rigged sails carried them farther than any previous European ocean explorers.

At the bitter end

To guard against accidental loss of the anchor, the bitter (inboard) end of the anchor rode should be made fast to some part of the boat. You may do this by leading the line below, perhaps through a deck pipe, and securing it to a strong point with an eye bolt or similar fastener. On small boats where the entire length of rode is carried on deck, you can have an eye splice in the bitter end to fit a securely fastened ring or eyebolt. In any case, make sure the bitter end is fastened, but always have handy a means of cutting the anchor line in an emergency - even if you think you could unfasten it quickly.

How many, how heavy?

The number of anchors you should carry depends upon several things - the size of your boat, whether it is used only in familiar sheltered waters or cruises to many harbours and, to some extent, the type of anchor. Some small boats have only a single anchor, but this cannot be considered adequate. Even discounting the possibility of fouling one anchor so badly that it cannot be retrieved, there are occasions when it is desirable to lie to two. Consider the possibility that one anchor heavy enough for extreme conditions could be a nuisance in ordinary weather.
